1. 2,800+ Journals (12 million articles, 80 million pages)

JSTOR Today (Access)

2. Available through more than 11,000 institutions in 175 countries

4. Over 1,000 institutions get free access in Africa and Developing Nations
5. 72,000 individual JPASS subscribers; 500,000 MyWorkspace registrants

1. 9 million articles are free-to-read for registered users.

The Problem

- Libraries' special and primary source collections can be hard to find and hard to use.
- Even when digitized and available online, they often sit outside the research workflow, and don't interoperate with many of the tools researchers use to do their work
- It is often hard to make investments in the ongoing maintenance of these digital collections so that they can evolve to meet changing research needs

Our Solution

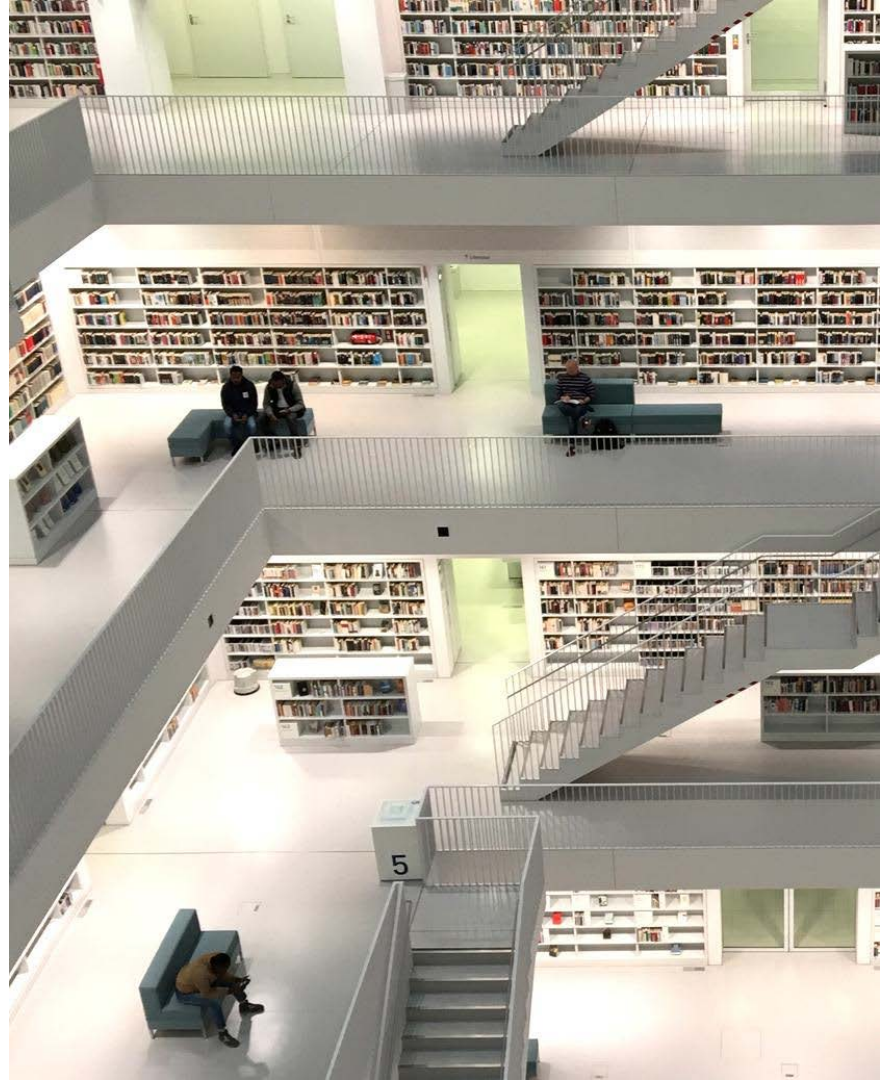
- Enable libraries to host their digitized collections on the JSTOR platform, where they'll be integrated alongside the books and journals there
- Make it easy for libraries to participate: collections can be published through JSTOR Forum, or harvested if already openly available
- Collections can be openly available, will benefit from the tools on JSTOR, and will be maintained on a sustainable platform

Three Components

- Seamless convenient **discovery** and **access** to relevant content regardless of format -- journals, books, primary sources, etc.
- A hosting environment for collections contributed by libraries and a set of digital library services to support it.
- **Tools** to enhance user engagement and collaboration.

Library-contributed collections on JSTOR

- Currently working with a group of CRL-member libraries (South Asia Open Archives - SAOA) to launch their collections on JSTOR
- Collaborating with libraries to make JSTOR “their platform” - not just a place that hosts licensed content, but a place that integrates with the library’s local collections



Expansive access

- **Many libraries want their collections to be openly available - and so do we**
- **Aligns with our growing corpus of OA content, and our recent acquisition of Reveal Digital**
- **Collections can also be made privately available to users at your institution**



Connecting primary and secondary literature

- Puts locally digitized collections in the research workflow
- Situates them in context - connected to the secondary literature that helps better understand them
- Your collections will be integrated with all of the books, journals, images and primary sources on JSTOR



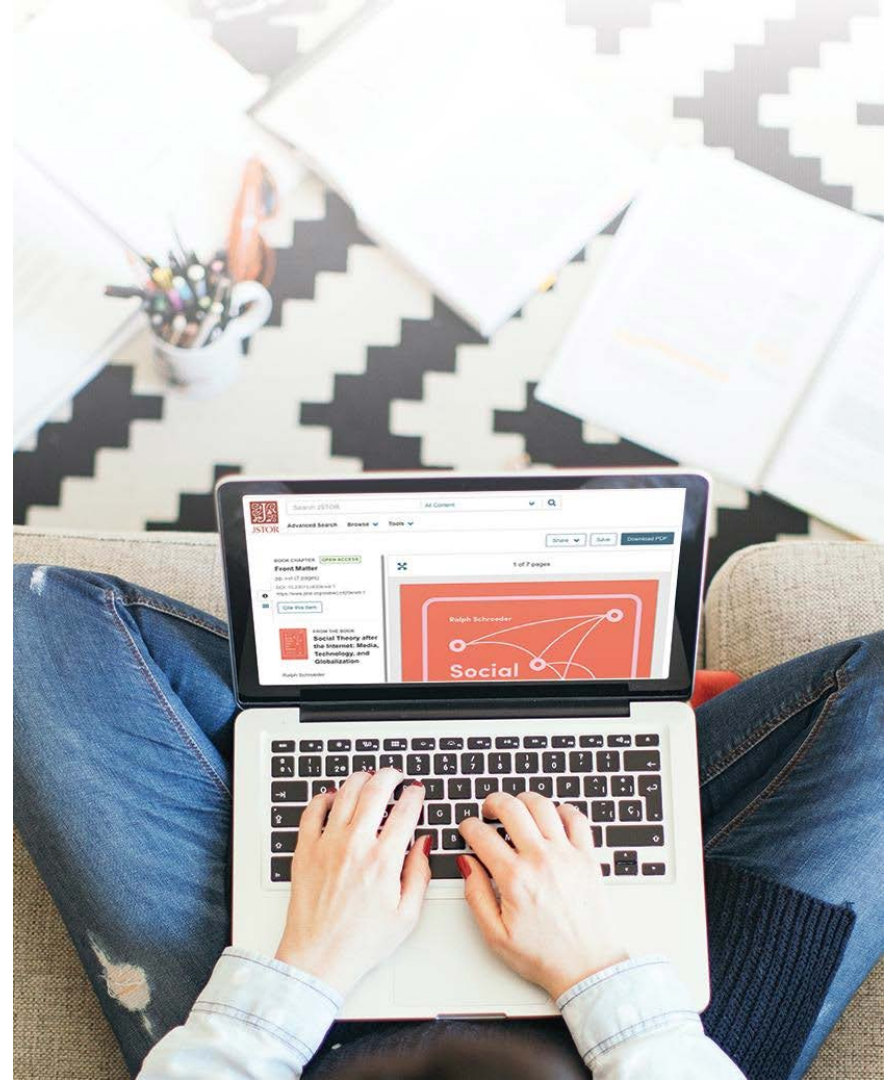
Institutional impact

- Your collections will have prominent institutional branding, a landing page, and the ability to search within them
- Usage reports to help understand their reach and impact
- Ability to engage with a global audience, raise the visibility of your institution, and impact scholarship



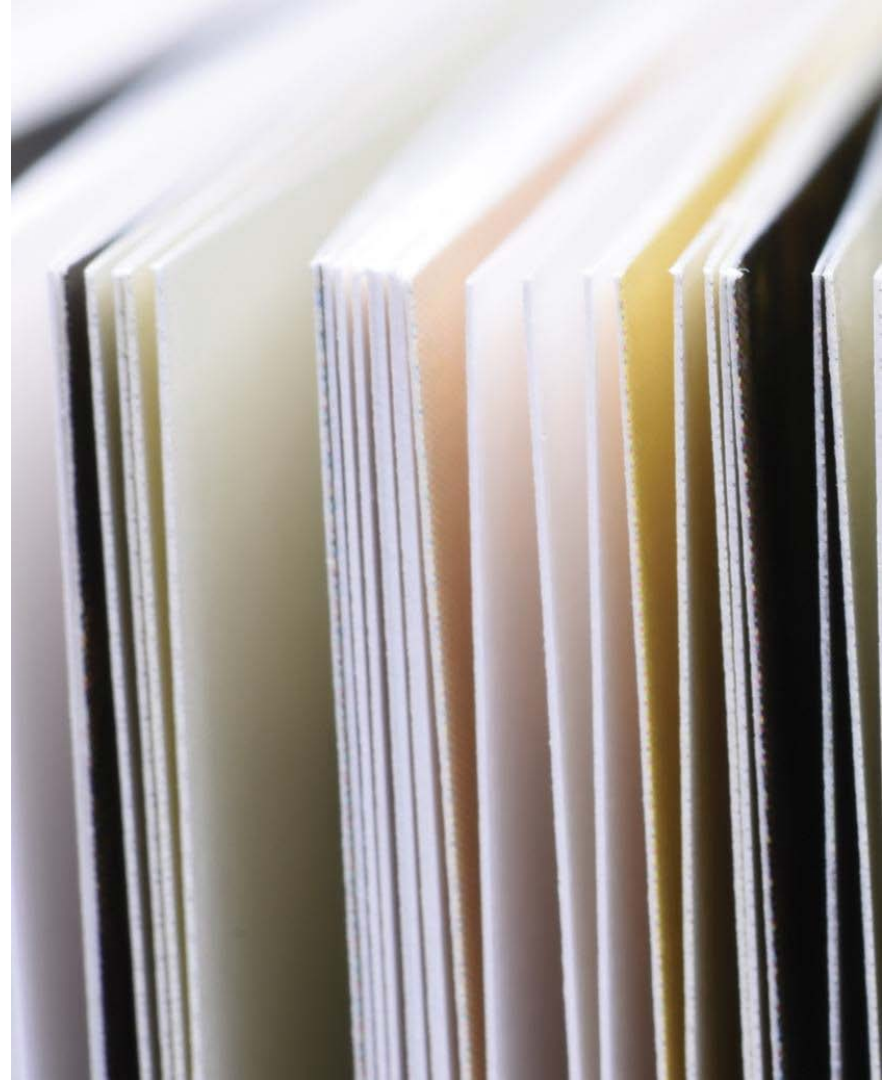
Optimizing for future research needs

- Collections can lose value over time if they are not actively managed
- Must continue to be viable as new research and discovery techniques emerge (such as text and data mining)
- Leverages our experience in managing a sizeable corpus of content over the past 20 years



Preservation

- Our mission has been to ensure the long-term availability of the content on JSTOR
- Extensive expertise through Portico
- Many library collections are particularly 'at risk' because of their unique nature



Collaborative development

- We believe that we can solve the problem of seamless access to digitized collections in collaboration with libraries
- Just as in the early days of JSTOR, we are looking for institutions to share feedback and partner with us as we develop this initiative
- Have already received valuable feedback from many libraries

First round of digitization by SAOA focused on official publications from colonial British India, nineteenth- and twentieth-century archival collections.

- Colonial-era administrative and trade reports
- Women's periodicals

- Census materials and gazetteers

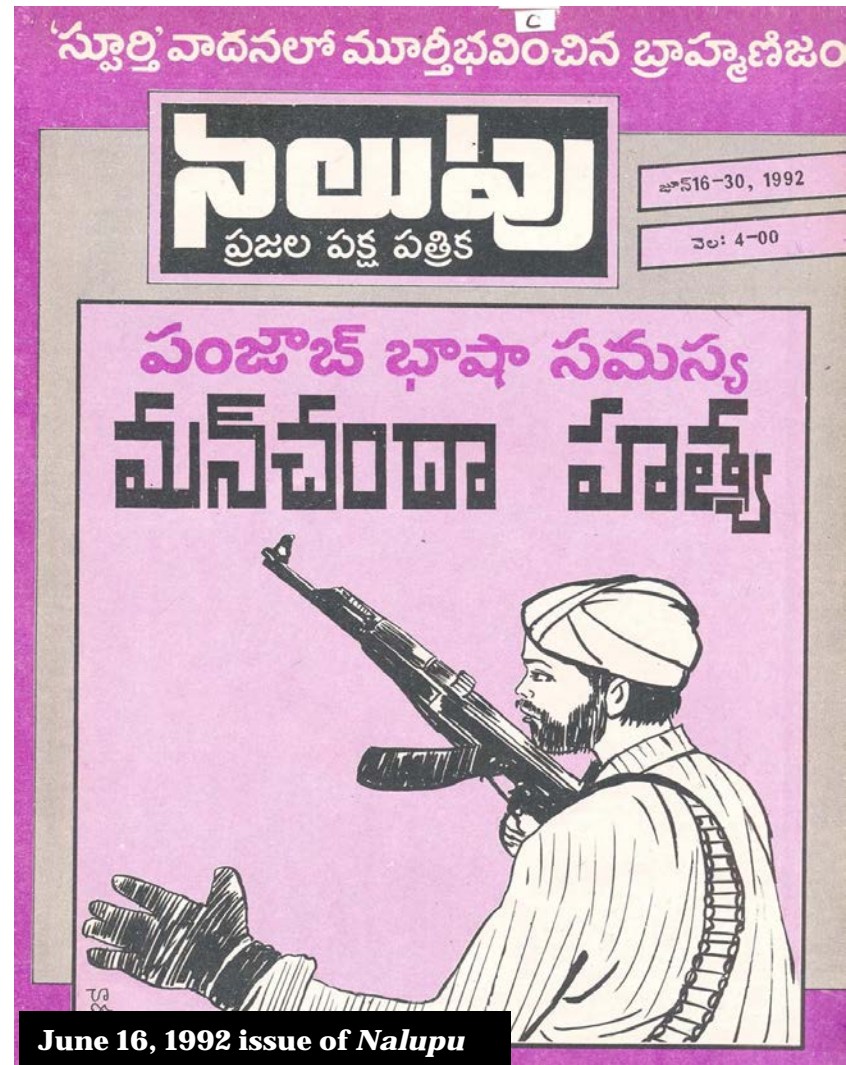

The South Asia Open Archives (SAOA) invites researchers to explore its openly accessible collection of research materials from and about South Asia. SAOA is an initiative of a broad consortium of research libraries and their respective South Asian Studies librarians, with substantial contributions of content, and human and material resources. Affiliated with the [South Asia Materials Project](#), administratively hosted by the [Center for Research Libraries](#) (CRL), and presented for open access online via a partnership with JSTOR/Ithaka, SAOA is a curated collection of digitized materials from across the region, spanning a variety of subjects and languages. Current collection development priorities highlight resources related to themes of caste & social structure, literature, social & economic history, and women & gender, covering a wide spectrum of types, including monographs,
